As a first year student in 1986, I got involved in the Christian Socialist Movement and have participated actively in it since then, while at the same time helping with the youth work in my local parish. From 1989-91 I was the WSCF Contact person for EKIX (one of the Christian Socialist

groups in Greece).

My involvement with WSCF began in June 1987 when I joined the preparatory group for the joint ESG-WSCF conference on "Mission", in Wambeck, Germany. Since then I have taken part in several other WSCF activities, such as the Women's Conference on "Women and Spirituality" (Strasbourg, March 1989), the Conference on "Nationalism" (St. Pölten, Austria, November 1990) and finally the ERA (Hirschluch, August 1991) where my (thrilling) election as Chairperson took place.

It was through WSCF that I was given the chance to participate in ecumenical meetings and this has always been for me an exciting and challenging experience. As an Orthodox Greek I have often felt the difficulties of dialogue "on equal terms", because of the Western/Northern and Protestant domination in WSCF, so one of my main preoccupations will be to encourage and promote an active presence of movements that have so far been "marginalised" (movements from Southern and Eastern Europe and Orthodox movements)."

"My name is Ingrid, I am 26 years old, and live in Oslo, Norway. I am educated as a social worker, and have worked for two and a half years at this in Oslo. For the last year I have been studying sociology at the University in Oslo. My plan is to continue to a Masters Degree in Sociology, two years from now.

In the ERA in Hirschluch in Summer '91, I was elected to be one of the two European representatives on the Executive Committee of WSCF. This will be my main task in the ERC, and I am elected for three years. For the last 4-5 years I have been working in the SCM of Norway, with different tasks, on a local level with student work in Oslo, and on a national level, especially in a committee for international questions, where I am still engaged. Within this committee, I have been specially concerned about Middle East issues, and have done work preparing conferences in Norway, a trip to Palestine in Summer '91, and other engagement on this issue in Norwegian SCM. I am also in a group working on human rights issues within the Norwegian Church."

"My role on the ERC is to coordinate the production of MOZAIK and WSCF-Europe's Publications Network. MOZAIK, as the Region's magazine, is intended to keep people in WSCF-Europe in touch with each other - to

provide a means of communication between the various national movements or SCMs. The Publications Network is a forum for people interested in, or involved with, magazines in their own SCMs, to swap articles,

ideas, moral support, etc.

My first involvement in the murky world of student publishing came some time ago with a university newspaper. Eventually I grew tired of the political battles with the editor necessary to get an article published, and decided to become an editor myself. I got involved with a now well-known international humanities magazine, which is curently not being published for operational reasons, and my horizons grew even wider. In true journalistic fashion, I made plans over a long, expenses-paid lunch in an exotic foreign city: the concept grew of a Europe-wide publication, bringing together between two covers the activities of all the European SCMs, reflecting their concerns and interests, their work and events, and sent directly to the members themselves. And so it was, from Vienna to Amsterdam, and finally to Hirschluch. The rest, as they say, is not particularly interesting.

I have been involved in British SCM for the last few years, attending various conferences and meetings, and am now part of the process to try to increase the profile of WSCF within Britain. I live in north-eastern England, in Hull, where I am currently trying to find time to write up an enormously long thesis on international law. I sometimes experiment with flattened thirteenth chords on the guitar or go along to my local SCM group, but often just stay at home trying to keep

Maybe I shouldn't expect a direct reply? - while I am waiting and pondering over this, I might as well start collecting some of the more basic details about myself, things just easy enough not to see them vanish the moment I want to grasp them. Just to give you something to read while we wait...

I am a white heterosexual female. I am German. I am a student of German and English literature and linguistics at the Free University of Berlin with the option to become a secondary school teacher after I finish. Which I might or might not choose to do.

I spent my happy childhood living out in the woods, sleeping in tents and hanging around camp-fires, singing, dancing, exploring foreign lands with a couple of close friends. Or in more technical language, I joined the Scout movement when I was little, took over the responsibility of group leader quite soon and became deeply involved in the movement.

I was in fact still working with young adults in our Berlin groups, trying to initiate programmes on political, social and environmental issues (you can't spend all your life out there in the woods, can you?), when I very innocently joined the ERA in Hirschluch last summer...

I got involved with SCM when I spent six months in England, studying English literature at the University of East Anglia in Norwich (1989/90). Back home, I then found my way to our Berlin ESG (SCM), but I had obviously needed this impetus from the British!

Before i went to England, I had been in touch with a more fundamentalist Christian student group. I value their commitment to live a spiritual life - or call it a Christian life - but their concept of God was not mine, their answers to my burning questions seemed too narrow.

To me, social and political awareness and action are an integral part of my search for God, and luckily, in the SCMs I know I have found people of a similar understanding to work and discuss and argue with.

Then suddenly I was asked at the ERA, Wouldn't I like to work at WSCF European level as a member of the ERC? I didn't exactly feel called to agree, being acutely aware there had to be lots of people more experienced and generally more able to do the job. But somehow all these people did not show up for my rescue... I accepted the challenge. And since then, I can feel myself almost physically growing with the tasks. (wie ein Luftballon der aufgeblasen wird)

As I had joined the women's interest group because of the feminist interests I have developed during my studies, I decided to stand for the position of women's coordinator. And it seemed they wanted me-You will find out more about the women's work when you read the Women's Newsletter!!

You might have wondered why I had such a difficult start telling you something about myself. In fact, these problems sort of started last summer, since when I have gone through a few periods of identity crisis: my student identity is in danger because I have no more time for studying. And in different meetings and conferences I questioned and tried to shape and tell others about my Christian, Lutheran identity, my feminist self, my inescapably advantaged position as a white person from Western Europe, as a German; as someone representing WSCF-Europe without yet a solid knowledge of all the structures...

I sometimes find myself hoping for some direct message from above to clear up some mess or other - and then while I go on by myself I do have the feeling She is around."

The treasurer is always second best. I agree!

It was not money, rather aikido and politics, that made my world go round! (It was only that for years my politics were argued down economically.) But then - how did I come to where I am now? When I joined the ERA I asked some general questions concerning the finances - to find myself being asked to be the next treasurer. What did it mean? Challenge, playground, experience, alternative project, feast? How would you have responded?

I agreed, you know. At that moment and still now I'm trying to pass my Finals in economics at the Free University of West Berlin. In the past my subjects were 'development theory', 'international relations', 'the economic

history of Europe' and the 'inbeddedness of economy in its society' but motivated mostly politically. During two years of my studies I tried to find the way to paradise (harmony and wealth, you know) in the faculty of theology. But I came back ruefully to economics since theology doesn't speak about that paradise and even more: they cannot manage the church's own daily life problems, nor have they a vision for justice in a world-society, because theologians in general know too little about economics (at least).

It is still hard to wake up. But in that time I started doing chassidic dances with SCM friends. We discovered gender analysis, Jewish and liberation theology. And I got a third spiritual education programme with Brazilian youth.

What I'd like to do as treasurer of the ERC includes: The teaching of 'God the economist' in the world religions; economics beyond individual and linear development-rationality; the Biblical and the daily ethics of money; the Church identity between administrative bureaucracy and firm; and Meditation and activity in economic life. Concretely, there will at least be a new financial structure and report-system.

In the ERC I enjoy our different experiences even more than half a year ago and I think we could be a fruitfully sharing community. And I hope that in 1993 more people in European SCMs know something about the Biblical version of a just economy, share and deal with finances and know how others do it. For me, it is the more important task of the Centennial Fund project. Perhaps we can even grow to be a voice on the people's side in the European market integration process."

What is the ERC?

The European Regional Committee is appointed every two years by the ERA to oversee the work and activities of WSCF-Europe, represent it on official bodies, plan conferences, employ staff, etc.

As well as those members shown, also on the current ERC are José Manuel de Jesus Cerquiera (Portugal, Regional Balance) and Robert Schoen (France, ExCo); a Solidarity Coordinator will soon be chosen.
